SITE IMPROVEMENT PLAN 2023

This year we have 2 goals on our SITE IMPROVEMENT PLAN

- **1.** To improve reading across the school (increasing the number of students meeting the standard of education and higher)
- 2. To improve numeracy (increasing the number of students meeting the standard of education and higher).

We have been busy working on both areas. One major development will be the implementation of a consistent daily intervention program *for students in Years R-6 who are experiencing difficulties with reading.* We recently had some training with the Literacy Guarantee Unit and will be rolling this program out this week. All SSO's and teachers are very excited – the program compliments our INITIALIT reading program in the R-2 classes and aligns with the department units that we are implementing in all classes.

recognition and comprehension.

When children read fluently, it's easier for them to understand what they're reading. And they read aloud easily and with expression — this makes reading a lot more enjoyable!

Less fluent readers read more slowly and word by word. They must focus their attention on figuring out the words, leaving them little attention for understanding the meaning of text. Comprehension and motivation to read can suffer. Of course, beginning readers aren't fluent yet, but by the end of first grade, kids should be reading books at their grade level with ease and expression.

Fluency develops gradually over time and through practice. At the earliest stage of reading development, students' oral reading is slow and laboured because students are just learning to "break the code" – to attach sounds to letters and to blend letter sounds into recognisable words.

When fluent readers read silently, they recognise words automatically. They group words quickly to help them gain meaning from what they read. Fluent readers read aloud effortlessly and with expression. Their reading sounds natural, as if they are speaking.

Because fluent readers do not have to concentrate on decoding the words, they can focus their attention on what the text means. They can make connections among the ideas in the text and their background knowledge. In other words, fluent readers recognise words and comprehend at the same.

How can you help your child to become a more fluent reader?

What parents can do to help at home

- Support and encourage your child. Realise that he or she may be frustrated by reading.
- Check with your child's teachers to find out their assessment of your child's word decoding skills.
- If your child can decode words well, help him or her build speed and accuracy by:
 - Reading aloud and having your child match his voice to yours
 - \circ $\;$ Having your child practice reading the same list of words, phrase, or short passages several times
 - o Reminding your child to pause between sentences and phrases
- Read aloud to your child to provide an example of how fluent and expressive reading sounds!

Hi everyone! I hope you are all doing well. I have been sharing a few recipes lately; here is a special one to share (a great family favourite)

Cinnamon Cake

4 eggs 2 heaped cups SR flour 4 level tablespoons of custard powder 2 cups of sugar Breakfast cup of milk 1tspn vanilla 8 oz butter/margarine

METHOD: soften butter, and tip everything in together in a bowl. Mix on slow speed for 30 seconds, then higher speed for 3 minutes. Cook in a moderate oven for 35-40 minutes. While warm, put melted butter on top with pastry brush and sprinkle cinnamon/sugar mixture on top. For cinnamon mixture – just mix sugar and cinnamon together. Enjoy! Helen (3)
